DRAFT REGIONAL DROUGHT RESILIENCE PLAN

Author: Anthony Archie, CEO (DM:7417955)

Recommendation:

The board endorses the Draft Regional Drought Resource Plans for Wet Tropics and Gulf Hinterland to proceed to the next stage of review by CSIRO.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

The developed comprehensive draft Regional Drought Resilience Plans (RDRPs) for the Wet Tropics and Gulf Hinterland are at the draft stage and are currently with CSIRO to provide further feedback and review. These drafts, shaped through significant local collaboration and expertise, are prepared to be reviewed and endorsed by the FNQROC Board. This endorsement is crucial under the joint funding arrangement from the Australian Government's Future Drought Fund and the Queensland Government, facilitated through the Queensland Department of Agriculture and Fisheries and the Rural Economies Centre of Excellence. The drafts aim to enhance regional resilience, focusing on agricultural sustainability and community preparedness for future drought scenarios. A further endorsement will be sought after CSIRO's review to finalise the plans if the FNQROC are happy with the content.

BACKGROUND:

The Regional Drought Resilience Planning (RDRP) initiative is a collaborative effort aimed at bolstering drought resilience across Queensland, with particular attention to its diverse agricultural landscapes. This planning effort is integrally tied to the Queensland Strategy for Disaster Resilience, ensuring a harmonised approach to disaster and drought resilience. The draft plans for the Wet Tropics and Gulf Hinterland were developed through a consultative process involving FNQROC, NRM organisations, local councils, academic institutions like James Cook University, and various community and industry stakeholders.

The plans are designed to foster social capital, promote community-led planning, and ensure that the strategies implemented are reflective of the specific needs and characteristics of each region. This local co-design has been supported by insights from both traditional and scientific knowledge bases, ensuring a robust, integrative approach to resilience planning. Furthermore, the drafts have been reviewed by the FNQROC Climate Resilience Technical Committee, ensuring alignment with existing or developing local and regional strategic frameworks and adding an extra layer of scrutiny and expert feedback.

In summary, the FNQROC Board's endorsement of these drafts will be a significant step forward in regional efforts to manage drought risk proactively. This will not only support agricultural sustainability but also enhance the overall socio-economic resilience of the Wet Tropics and Gulf Hinterland communities. The final plans, once refined and endorsed, will play a pivotal role in the proactive management of drought impacts in these regions.

WASTE MANAGEMENT AND RESOURCE RECOVERY ADVISORY GROUP

Recommendation:

The terms of reference for the FNQROC Resource Recovery Advisory Committee are reviewed, and participating Councils nominate a representative for the advisory committee.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

FNQROC recently received funding for a Regional Waste Coordinator from the Department of Environment, Science, and Innovation. This long-awaited funding allows the region to progress with the implementation of its Regional Resource Recovery Plan, which was adopted in 2023. With the implementation phase beginning and endorsement from the technical committee, it is now appropriate to re-establish the Waste Management and Resource Recovery Advisory Group. This group, comprising elected officials, who will meet every three to four months to oversee the plan's implementation.

BACKGROUND:

FNQROC has developed the Regional Resource Recovery Plan (RRR Plan), or to be renamed the Regional Waste Management Plan (RWMP), to address the critical issues of waste management and resource recovery across its 11 participating council areas. This plan is a comprehensive framework designed to improve resource recovery, minimise waste generation, and create a circular economy that benefits the region environmentally, socially, and economically.

Key Objectives of the RRR Plan:

- The plan sets ambitious targets to significantly reduce the amount of waste sent to landfills by promoting recycling and reuse.
- Through a series of actions, the plan aims to optimise resource recovery facilities, enhance kerbside collection approaches, and develop alternatives to landfills for residual waste.
- The implementation of the plan is projected to bring economic development, create local jobs, and improve environmental outcomes by reducing carbon emissions and protecting natural resources such as the Great Barrier Reef and the Daintree Rainforest.

Challenges Addressed by the RRR Plan:

• FNQROC councils face challenges such as large transport distances, low economies of scale, and aging infrastructure.

• Changing policies and a lack of local secondary markets hinder effective waste management and resource recovery.

Eight Key Actions of the RRR Plan:

- 1. Step-change in Customer Engagement: Increase community awareness and participation in recycling and waste reduction.
- 2. Optimise Regional Servicing Arrangements: Improve waste collection and processing efficiencies across councils.
- 3. New Transfer Station Facilities and Closure of Facilities with Regulatory or Environmental Issues: Develop new transfer stations and close non-compliant ones to enhance resource recovery.
- 4. Enhance Kerbside Collection Approach: Expand kerbside recycling and organic waste collection services.
- 5. Maximise Diversion of Organic Waste from Landfill: Implement initiatives to collect and process organic waste separately.
- 6. Optimise Regional Network of Resource Recovery Facilities: Develop a network of facilities to improve local processing and reduce transportation costs.
- 7. Develop a Centralised Resource Recovery Precinct: Establish a hub for processing and re-using waste materials to support regional infrastructure.
- 8. Develop Alternatives to Landfill for Residual Waste: Explore and implement long-term solutions for residual waste management.

Importance of the Elected Officials Committee:

It is proposed that the re-establishment of an elected officials committee for regional waste is essential for the following reasons:

- Ensuring effective implementation and oversight of the RRR Plan actions.
- Facilitating cooperation among the 11 participating councils to share resources, knowledge, and best practices.
- Securing necessary funding and regulatory support from State and Federal governments to achieve the plan's targets.

This committee will play a crucial role in ensuring the RRR plan is progressing and that there is a commitment from all participating councils to work on this regional problem and opportunity.

REGIONAL STRATEGY AND STATE AND FEDERAL DELEGATION

- a) meet again in July to confirm the regional priorities for an August Queensland Parliament Delegation; and/or
- b) members send a delegation to Queensland State Parliament for the August sitting period 20^{th} to 22^{nd} of August; and/or
- c) members send a delegation to the Australian Federal Parliament for the 2 weeks of sitting period in November.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

FNQROC recognises the importance of presenting a united front on key regional priorities during delegations. Our success is often attributed to a cohesive and focused list of priorities, distilled to a single top priority when necessary, ensuring clarity and impact in our advocacy efforts. This approach has proven effective, as evidenced by recent inquiries from state and federal treasurers regarding our number one priority. A unified stance on regional issues fosters respect and yields greater long-term benefits, strengthening our influence with policymakers.

Given the new term and the eagerness of elected officials to review and update strategies, FNQROC staff will discuss current and developing strategies, allowing for valuable input from members. This feedback will ensure our advocacy aligns with the latest needs of all member councils.

Following these discussions, we will organise a session to confirm the priorities, creating a cohesive document for the Queensland State Parliament Delegation. Attending the Queensland Parliament during the August sitting period allows us to advocate directly to decision-makers before the election, ensuring our region's needs are prioritised.

Similarly, attending the Federal Parliament in November aligns with budget preparations, allowing us to influence federal funding allocations for Far North Queensland. This proactive engagement enhances our region's prospects and demonstrates our commitment to advancing the interests of our communities through direct federal and state engagement. The delegation will focus on maximising face-to-face time with key ministers and senators over a concentrated two to three-day period.

BACKGROUND:

Regional Priorities

The importance of attending delegations with a united front on key priorities cannot be overstated. FNQROC's success is often attributed to presenting a cohesive and focused list of regional priorities. Having a finite list, distilled to a single top priority if necessary, ensures clarity and impact when engaging with key decision-makers. A unified stance on regional issues that affect most councils demonstrates our collective commitment to the broader interests of Far North Queensland. Even if a particular priority does not directly impact an individual council, supporting the regional view fosters respect and yields greater long-term benefits. This collaborative strategy not only strengthens our advocacy efforts but also enhances our credibility and influence with policymakers.

We are empathetic to the challenges that this is a new term, and many of your elected officials are eager to review and update your respective councils' strategies and priorities. Recognising this, each FNQROC staff member will briefly discuss the current strategies, areas of concern, and strategies in development during our meeting. This will allow you to offer valuable guidance to FNQROC executives on which areas should be prioritised or where additional information is required. Your insights are crucial to ensuring our regional advocacy is aligned with all member councils' latest needs and aspirations, thereby enhancing the effectiveness and relevance of our collective efforts.

Following this, we could organise a brief session, either remotely or in person, to confirm the priorities suggested during today's meeting, with the support of the FNQROC executive team. This would form a document that is taken on the Queensland State Parliament Delegation.

Queensland State Parliament Delegation

Sending a delegation to the Queensland Parliament during the August sitting period, just before the state enters caretaker mode for the upcoming election, presents a strategic opportunity for FNQROC. This timing allows the delegation to advocate directly to key decision-makers while they are still actively engaged in parliamentary duties. By presenting our region's priorities and pressing issues before the election, we can ensure that our needs are top-of-mind for policymakers and candidates alike. This proactive approach enhances our ability to secure commitments and support for regional initiatives, which is crucial for the continued development and prosperity of Far North Queensland. Furthermore, it positions FNQROC as a proactive and influential advocate for our member councils, demonstrating our commitment to advancing the interests of our communities through direct engagement with state leaders.

Australian Federal Parliament Delegation

Sending a delegation to the Federal Parliament during the November two-week sitting period is a strategic move for FNQROC, as it aligns with the crucial phase of Federal budget preparations leading into the formal budget discussions in January. Engaging with federal policymakers at this juncture allows us to present our region's priorities and funding needs while budget allocations are still being shaped. This timing ensures that the unique challenges and opportunities of Far North Queensland are considered in the upcoming federal budget. Additionally, by advocating

during this period, FNQROC can build momentum and foster relationships with key decision-makers, positioning our region favourably for future funding and policy support. It also demonstrates our proactive approach to securing essential resources and highlights our commitment to advancing the well-being and development of our communities through direct federal engagement.

The delegation would not last two weeks; we would attend for two to three days, squeezing as much face-to-face time as we can with Federal Ministers and Senators.

Dear Mr Archie

I refer to your letter of 8 December 2023 to the former Minister for Transport and Main Roads and Minister for Digital Services, about two proposed options for the Barron River bridge at Kuranda.

I appreciate you have taken the time to provide feedback on the two options presented by the Department of Transport and Main Roads (TMR). I have passed on your feedback to the project team.

I am advised the two proposed highest ranked options are now being investigated in more detail in the business case stage. Feedback from the community and stakeholders who use the bridge every day plays an important part in determining the most suitable solution.

I acknowledge that a safe and reliable crossing over the Barron River at Kuranda is critical for Far North Queensland. I have asked TMR to accelerate the planning study and it is expected to be completed in 2024. While planning is carried out, TMR will continue to monitor the existing bridge via a detailed inspection and monitoring program to ensure the bridge remains safe and operational.

In early 2022, TMR released the outcome of a planning study investigating capacity, safety, and efficiency improvements of transport routes between Cairns and the Northern Tablelands. The study investigated the current issues, future needs, and potential solutions to improve performance. The outcome of the planning is a road map of initiatives and investments to help TMR deliver the right infrastructure at the right time.

While there are clear challenges with the routes between the coast and the Northern Tablelands, none of the existing corridors are operating at capacity. The study shows there is currently no clear technical justification for a major upgrade of existing routes, or construction of a new road along a new alignment. The main challenges identified relate to network resilience, travel reliability and freight access.

I am advised TMR is working with the Australian Government to develop an appropriate scope of works and construction timeframes for the safety and resilience upgrades on Kuranda Range Road.

I am also advised that, in early 2022, the Queensland Government requested the Australian Government to consider including the Kennedy Highway (Cairns – Mareeba), which includes Kuranda Range Road, as part of the National Land Transport Network (NLTN). It should be noted, that declaring a road as NLTN does not guarantee it will attract additional funding, or as a non-NLTN road, preclude it from Australian Government funding.

I trust this information is of assistance.
